

Your questions answered







Do all schools have a board of governors?

Yes, all schools must have a governing body.

How much time commitment does being a Governor take?

Generally there are two full governing body (FGB) meetings per term, plus two meetings for each of the primary committees such as resources and curriculum. There are also opportunities to get involved in school monitoring visits, such as reviewing policies or supporting with staff recruitment.

Why do schools' need a Governing Body?

To ensure the school has a clear vision, ethos and strategic direction; to hold the Headteacher to account for the educational performance of its pupils and the effective and efficient performance management of staff; and to oversee the financial performance of the school and make sure its money is well spent. We aim to be a critical friend providing both support and challenge to the school.

If I was interested in becoming a Governor what would I need to do?

Governor vacancies are advertised on the school website, and parents are notified via email when governor opportunities become available. If you are interested and would like to know more please email us at

Hello, I am Vanessa, the Governor linked to Health and Safety (H&S). As part of my role I am a member of the H&S Committee alongside Mrs Marriott, Mr Birkin - site manager and Mrs Coulter - office manager. I also undertake a termly inspection of the school, completed with Mrs Marriott and Mr Birkin. The purpose of this inspection is to ensure that the school premises are a safe place for staff, pupils and visitors to work and learn.

The inspection for the Spring term was undertaken on 19 March 2021. I am pleased to report that overall the school is well maintained, in good condition and the appropriate H&S and compliance checks are undertaken to ensure it is a safe place. We took the opportunity to discuss areas previously identified for improvement that needed budgeting for, such as carpets, internal and external redecoration and doors. With the 2021/2022 budget soon to set this was the ideal time to firm up plans.

Since school reopened in June 2020 to a wider cohort of children, the school inspections have also given me the opportunity to see first-hand some of the COVID safe measures that have been implemented. The school is kept clean and is benefitting from daytime as well as after school cleaning.

The phases (FS, KS1, Lower KS2 and Upper KS2) are kept apart in their bubbles and staff from each phase have their own staff room area. Each bubble has their own equipment, such as for outside play, and it is easily accessible to the children. Hand sanitiser and good hand washing facilities are available throughout school. Windows are open to allow good ventilation.

What I have been especially pleased to see during my inspections is the children happily learning and playing together in their bubbles. Although we as adults in and out of school face restrictions, the impact on our children in school is not impeding their opportunities for learning and play.

- 3. Professional Clerking, Kathryn always ensures that we have the right information for the right meeting in good time, recording decisions taken at meetings and ensuring we undertake all agreed actions.
- 4. Good relationships are important to be able to work well together as a team; in partnership with the teaching staff and parents. We all play a vital part in ensuring school life is the best for the children that come to learn at Hemingford.
- 5. Confidence to ask challenging questions having children's interests at the heart of everything we do.
