



Reporting results: Scaled scores

- * Parents and schools will be presented with a scaled score
- * A scaled score of 100 will represent the 'expected standard'
- * A pupil's scaled score will be based on their raw score and it will be translated into a scaled score using a conversion table
- * The scaled score will be reported alongside whether your child met the expected standard.
- * There is no requirement for the submission of teacher assessment in reading and maths.

* **Example:**

Mathematics (Test)	105	At expected Standard
English Reading (Test)	97	Not met standard
English Writing (TA)		Greater Depth

** Writing – working towards, at expected standard, greater depth

Last year to pass the raw scores were:

Reading: 28/50

GPS: 36/70

Maths: 58/110

Organisation

- * Breakfast snack provided
- * Tests start at 9.30am
- * Children split throughout the zone to provide space
- * Children CAN ask to have questions read to them
- * Adults cannot support in how to answer the question
- * Children eligible may have extra-time or a reader

Support at school – after half term

- * Before school
 - Time to complete focussed tasks
e.g. spelling, grammar, reading, maths, writing
- * Teacher led maths groups 8.15-8.45 – all children allocated two days
- * Optional grammar session with Mrs Read – allocated one slot
- * No sessions on a Friday

Support at home

- * Encourage and support children with homework – routine will help to be secondary school ready
- * Ask arithmetic questions which can be answered mentally or have a revision pad of paper for jottings
 - What is 5.6×100 ?
 - $630 \div 7 =$
- * Read a range of text types – ask questions
 - News reports
 - Stories
 - Poems
- * Encourage children to check thoroughly (recalculate if time)
